## *“Facing History, Anne Frank and Ourselves”*

This is an accredited Department of Education 30-hour “P” credit course, designed for teachers, but registration is open to all adults. The goal of the course is to help teachers discover the spirit within a 13 year old child that would enable and inspire her to write a diary that would ultimately become one of the most frequently read books in the world. It is meant advance the legacy of Anne Frank and examine the consequences of intolerance, prejudice, racism and anti-Semitism. The Diary of Anne Frank will be read and examined as a primary document of the Holocaust. There will be weekly videos, photographs, pictures and audios that relate to the topics covered, as well as guest speakers who are Holocaust survivors.

**Cost:** \$300.00 for 30 hours of class time over 5 days (\$100 will be applied to the D.O.E. registration fee).

A \$10 materials fee (payable at the first session) includes a copy of the Diary and a blank journal.

### **Some of the questions answered in this course include:**

- *How did Hitler create a racist, militaristic society?*
- *How did the German and Dutch people allow their countries to become totalitarian states?*
- *What is the role of the bystander?*
- *How effective were the Nuremberg Trials?*
- *Why was it necessary for the Germans to kill one and one half million children?*
- *What is the value of authentic documents such as Anne’s diary?*
- *How difficult is it to take an unpopular stand?*
- *Why is studying the Holocaust still relevant in today’s world?*

**Bringing Anne Frank to Life in Your Classroom** will be taught by Doreen Hazel, a former NYC classroom teacher. She has mentored new teachers for the D.O.E., worked as a consultant for the North Bellmore School District and as an adjunct teacher for NYU supervising student teachers. Doreen has received many awards. She was included in the New York Post’s “200 Outstanding Teachers of NYC,” December 7, 2001; Fulbright-Hays Summer Seminar for Teachers Fellowship to visit China, 1999; American Survivors of the Holocaust Fellowship to study the Holocaust and Its Resistance., 1998; Facing History and Ourselves 1994, 2001, 2006.
